The students aged between 12 – 14 years, spent their time linked to Year 7 and 8 students to get a taste of what 'a day in the life at Queen's Park High School' was like.

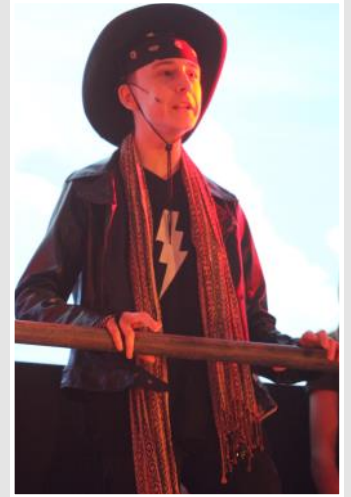


Our visitors spent time in lessons, making friends with our students, and were especially excited about sampling the different foods from our canteen!

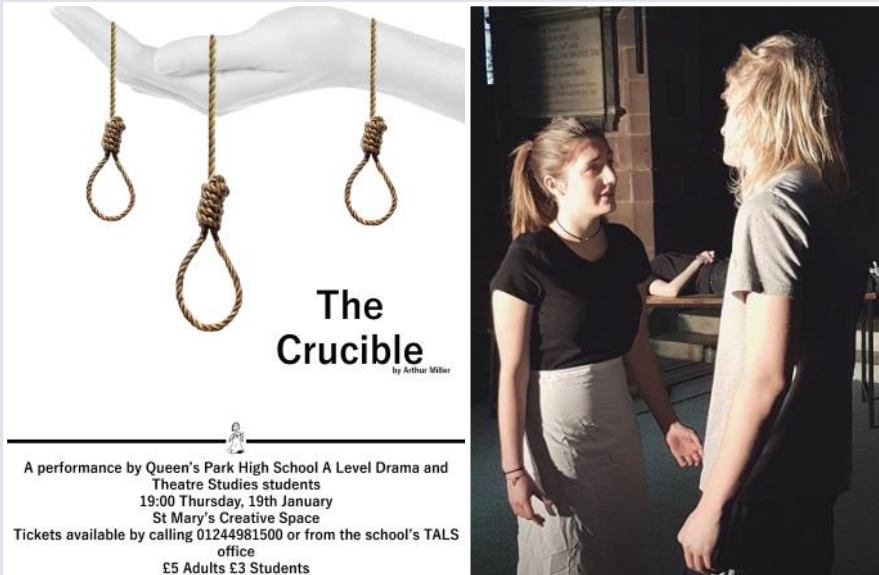

The theory of Psychoanalysis

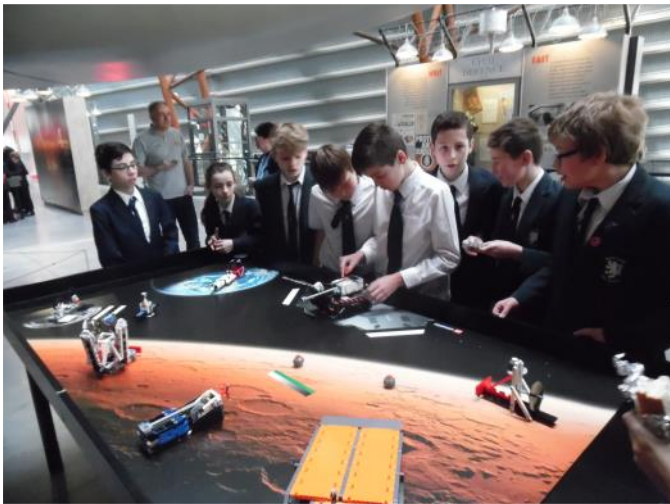

ETHICS CONFERENCE

What's your view on Euthanasia?

Sixth form students enjoyed a 'Vardy' conference day in Manchester last month listening to the great theologian Dr. Peter Vardy and key note speaker Dr. David Webster.

Vardy's enigmatic charisma spilled out into the conference room captivating the minds of our Year 12 and Year 13 students. This intensive event explored the big questions in the Philosophy of Religion and Ethics arguing for God exploring Aquinas' famous ways to God and the problem of evil and suffering, explaining the logical and evidential problem. Both topics relate directly to the exam specification. The day's debate was entitled 'this house sees legalising Euthanasia as the most loving response to suffering'. Manchester voted 80% in favour of this question - which was an overwhelming response from the students.

Ben Salmon, Year 13 spoke in the debate stating *"I believe that the hospice movement does incredible work. As the medication for an ill person decreases life expectancy, the 'doctrine of the double effect' takes place and we should allow them to be euthanized to end their torture and suffering"*.

Klara Sapinska, Year 12 spoke also in the debate stating, *"I'm neutral about Euthanasia. Yes it is ending someone's life but I can see why some people are for it. When it comes to Euthanasia you have to look at both sides of the argument"*.

PSYCHOLOGY WORKSHOPS

With Chester Zoo's spider monkeys

Year 12 and 13 Psychology students enthusiastically enjoyed a January trip to Chester Zoo and a chance to learn about animal behaviour in their environment and how it links to human behaviour. The two workshops which were interactive relate the research by Psychologists and animal behaviours and the evolution of human intelligence to the AQA syllabus.

Students thoroughly enjoyed the day and had the chance to see the chimpanzees, spider monkeys and orangutans plus a first glimpse of the new baby elephant!





BRITISH SCIENCE WEEK

Is it Magic or is it Physics?

During the week 13-17 March QPHS took part in British Science Week - it was a great success! As part of curriculum lessons, students entered the national poster competition entitled 'Change'. They came up with some considered ideas about what 'Change' meant to them in Science including changes to technology, climate change and changes throughout the year. During each lunch time that week, staff led various activities, including eye dissections, the magic of Physics and chemical explosions!

On Friday our STEM Ambassador, Roger Todd, came into school to share his experiences about engineering and entrepreneurship. Several classes also had the opportunity to take part in 'I'm a Scientist, Get me Out of Here' ; students spoke to real-life scientists via a webchat and asked them questions about their work. To top it all it was a chance for our Science teachers to show off their inner geek, by wearing Science themed T-Shirts and showcasing their favourite demonstrations!

Year 10 boys win Chester Schools Football Tournament

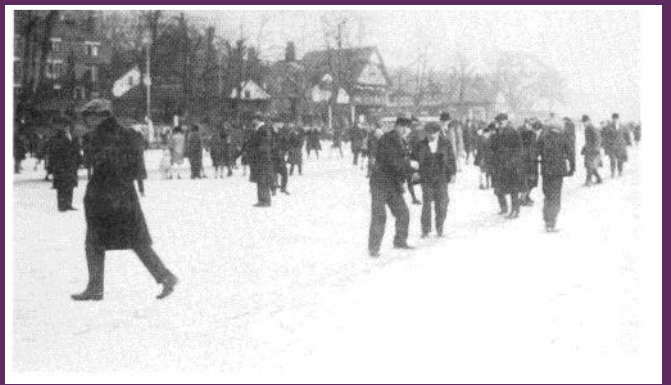

CLIMATE BOOK ISSUED By Former Geography Teacher

A former Geography teacher of Queen's Park High School, Geoff Nelder, has reissued his Chester's Climate book as an e-book. The book reveals fascinating weather anecdotes about Chester such as tornadoes, when the Dee froze over and how rain made the city walls fall down.

Geoff explains, "In 1985 I gathered my local climate research with the help of QPHS students (a volunteer rota took Met readings every three hours at a met station in the lower school quadrangle supported by automatic stations for over 10 years including the 1982 winter when the temp fell to -22 C). With photographs and anecdotes gleaned from libraries, the record office, staff and students I published *Chester's Climate: past and present*. It was printed in Handbridge and sold out its 400 copies by the end of the year.

Nowadays I write more fiction than non-fiction but by popular request I have rereleased Chester's Climate with updated data and commentary."
