

Dear Parents/Carers

As another academic year at Queen's Park High School draws to a close, I am writing to share some important updates in relation to the positive progress we have been making as a school over recent months in particular.

OFSTED

As you are aware, our school underwent an Ofsted inspection on 21 and 22 June 2016. Our inspection report has just been published which means that I am now openly able to share the outcomes with you and contextualise the feedback a little as well.

The inspection was carried out by a team of three inspectors who were incredibly professional, personable and transparent throughout the whole process. They met with staff, students, governors, observed over 30 lessons and read feedback from a range of surveys. Thank you to all those parents, carers, staff and students who took the time to respond to the surveys (particularly in the light of the tight turn around too). Your feedback was very helpful to the lead inspector.

During the course of the inspection, our students were a real credit to yourselves and to the school. They presented themselves well and engaged politely and respectfully with the inspectors. As a Senior Leadership Team, we approached the inspection with honesty and openness. The inspectors were presented with our own self-evaluation of the current position of the school in relation to the Ofsted criteria. This detailed our awareness of what is going well but was equally mindful of areas for improvement, particularly around the consistency of staffing, teaching and learning in some subject areas and student attendance (which needs to be above 95% for the school to be 'good'). The inspectors were reassured by our staffing model for September that details a new leadership structure and a full complement of staff in each curriculum area. I believe that the inspection process was very fair and reassuringly feel that the outcomes are in-line with our own views of where the school is at this point in time, but it won't be long before we have moved on again; I can assure you! Our overall judgement has remained as Requires Improvement, but I am delighted to say that we achieved 'good' for the 'effectiveness of leadership and management' and also for 'personal development and welfare'. The overwhelming feel of the feedback from the Ofsted team was that the school has made significant progress over recent months in particular, and with a little more time (say an additional six months) to provide further evidence of impact, we would definitely be looking to secure 'good'. One of the inspectors even commented that she would love to come back to see the school in another year to see the difference, knowing that it would be significant. Some key quotes which stand out in the report are:

- There is an improving trend in achievement.....Evidence from checking in books shows stronger progress in Year 10 and in Key Stage 3 for all ability levels across many subjects
- Pupils are smartly turned out and polite, often displaying good manners and mutual respect. The school is a calm, orderly environment
- Leaders have already established a culture of continual improvement
- There is now a high sense of unity, ambition and commitment amongst staff
- Positive relationships and strong subject knowledge is a feature of many lessons

We are determined that Queen's Park will become an outstanding school, one in which we all feel incredibly proud to play our part for the benefit of our students. That journey has already begun, with the areas identified for improvement already being addressed within an Ofsted Improvement Plan which is immediately available for you to read on our website www.qphs.cheshire.sch.uk alongside our final Inspection Report.

I would encourage you to read the report twice, in order to get a true picture beyond the first impression. 'Requires Improvement' reports have to be written in a particular way, with the negatives before the positives and sometimes (if you are anything like me) it is hard then to appreciate all the strengths, of which there are indeed many.

ACADEMY CONSULTATION

Please find below a statement from the Governing Body (as issued on 7 July 2016 following ratification at the Full Governing Body meeting) in relation to the academy consultation earlier this term:

Following the consultation held at QPHS between 22 April and 9 May 2016, the Governing body of QPHS wish to proceed with conversion to Academy status within Christleton Learning Trust (MAT). We would like to thank all parents, carers, members of the community who contributed so supportively during the consultation period. I too would like to thank everyone who took part in the consultation. It was very heartening to sense the affection, warmth and loyalty which many of you hold towards the school. Queen's Park High School will now progress its application. The process takes a number of months and is fairly complex, so we are aiming for a completion date of 1 December 2016.

As you are aware from the consultation letter, the Trust will comprise of three schools working in partnership together, Christleton High School, Queen's Park High School and Christleton International Studio. Ms Kate Ryan has recently been appointed as Principal of Christleton International Studio and she will be based at QPHS from September 2016. Recruitment for the Studio will commence shortly for a proposed September 2017 opening. As of yet however, I am unable to confirm where the Studio will be located; our site is currently being comprehensively reviewed for potential options.

Once we return in September, I will keep you fully informed about our progress in relation to our academy conversion. We are beginning to build a significant number of exciting links as a consequence of our vision, which will have a significant impact on the opportunities we will be able to offer our students here at Queen's Park going forwards. I won't tempt fate though by saying too much at this stage, we need to achieve our academy order as the first priority.

Using co-constructed approaches to

learning, groups were formed through interests of what could be designed and made. Students researched, planned and designed their own lessons, setting their own success and assessment criteria to shape and form the range of designs that is on display today.

Year 9 students, Charlotte Carswell and Zara Gautier-Price said,

"We really hope that this project will inspire others to do similar ventures as it was an experience that helped develop all students involved in different ways. It has been really enjoyable and given us all a feeling of achievement."

Leader of Learning for Art and Design Mr Parker said,

SOCIOLOGY & PSYCHOLOGY


Earlier this year, A2 Sociology students visited Sir John Deane's College in Northwich for a Sociology revision conference focusing on examination skills.
