


Year 5 Zoo Project

As part of an on-going project with Chester Zoo on the unsustainable production of palm oil, the children from Year 5 at Lache Primary School are exploring the critically endangered species of Borneo and Sumatra.

To further develop their art project work, the staff and children wanted to expand their ideas using Andy Warhol repeat silkscreen images as a starting point and asked if we at QPHS could help. Of course, we said yes and on 25th June, the students came to work with Mr Parker who led the workshop, ably supported by Miss Morris.

The workshop taught students the basic techniques of photoshop and gave them the opportunity to develop their creative skills, changing how the images of the endangered animals would look through the use of bright colours and different textures.

Students created a wide range of digital work during their visit and left with some fantastic finished pieces which will be showcased in an exhibition at their school.





‘TO INFINITY & BEYOND’

Year 5 Curriculum Challenge Day

On Wednesday 13th June, we were thrilled to welcome 240 Year 5 children, from schools within the Dee Schools Partnership, to our second Curriculum Challenge Day of the year. The theme of ‘No Limits’ was chosen as we firmly believe that there are no limits for children of this age and the world is theirs to learn about and grow into. As always, our curriculum teams rose to the challenge of planning and delivering some exciting learning opportunities to engage and challenge the Year 5 students.

In Maths, students were taken, ‘To Infinity and Beyond’ as they pursued the theme of ‘No Limits’. They investigated the symmetry properties of regular polygons before considering the symmetry of a circle (infinite lines of symmetry and order infinity rotational symmetry). Year 5 students then investigated and discovered the concept of Pi, which is approximately 3.14, but is actually a number that goes on into infinite decimal places with no repeating pattern.

In social studies, ‘No limits to God’s power’ was the topic of conversation. Children explored the concept of miracles and discussed real life events, unpicking what makes an event miraculous and what is simply a chain of unusual events. Year 5 students worked in groups to examine reported religious miracles and used evaluative skills to

explore reasons why they may or may not be considered a miracle.

The Visual Art department chose the theme of animals using the collaged animals of craft based artist Clare Young as inspiration. The concept of animals living in the wild, living with ‘no limits’ was the starting point for the animal designs. Working with a range of materials, students created patterned and highly decorative surfaces to adorn their animal bodies, all within an hour. What a feat!

Whilst students in Years 10 and 12 were undertaking work experience during enrichment week, the week beginning 2nd July was a fun-filled extravaganza of new and exciting learning opportunities for students in Years 7-9.

Two of the days were led by one of our partner groups 'Enabling Enterprise' who work with schools to develop students' wider employability skills. On Monday, students worked on the 'Law in Action' challenge in their tutor groups. They learned about the work of solicitors and barristers and had to prepare for and take on a legal case. Mr Johnson got a bit carried away in his role as the judge; he made an origami wig and kept banging on his desk and shouting "ORDER"!

On Wednesday, students worked in mixed-year house groups on a 'Bid to Build' activity, trying to promote the fictional town of Bogsby-on-Sea. Students were asked to consider how the town could be redeveloped and had to consider a range of factors, such as transport, renewable energy, tourism and housing. Numerous models of this charming town can now be found all over the school!

On Thursday, it was the annual Sports Day and, whilst the result of this is still a closely guarded secret, we are proud of the students who supported and competed for their houses. Will Eaton retain the cup or will Grosvenor or Westminster be victorious? We will find out on the last day of term.





On Tuesday and Friday students engaged in their choice of options for their activity days. Every student was lucky enough to have a wide range of choices and to be able to experience many different things. There were too many activities to list, but they included gardening, a river experience, a cycle ride to Parkgate, a trip to Storyhouse, Native American Arts, sports camp, origami, chess, a Duke of Edinburgh taster session and an enormous football competition. Students really enjoyed trying something different and all were engaged and challenged during the sessions. A huge thanks from Mrs Blears-Chalmers to all the staff who led and contributed to these activities. We are looking forward to next year already!



A group of twenty Key Stage 3 students had the opportunity to engage in a drama workshop with trainee teachers from the University of Chester.

The workshop was based on the development of awareness around cyber-security and the importance of keeping ourselves safe on the internet. Students developed their own understanding of the dangers of the internet and considered how important it is to stay safe online. It was a great learning experience for all involved and led brilliantly onto a practical workshop in the afternoon, which looked at identity and tolerance.

Through the Camera's Eye

“ For activity day I went on a walk around the meadows with Mr Parker, Mr Corker and a few other students, taking photographs as we went, to record and explore the different environments on the river bank. The teachers encouraged us to look for interesting lines, shapes and patterns in the environment, as well as teaching us the more technical aspects of the camera, such as how to manually adjust focus and play around with depth of field. We travelled through several contrasting areas in Chester and it was almost shocking how different they all were once you become hyper-aware of the shapes and patterns that create them. We experimented with macro and wide angled photography, different compositions, framing, symmetry and the rule of thirds. When we got back to school, we downloaded our images and then used photoshop tools to edit the light, colour and saturation and almost completely transformed the photos. It was a fantastic experience – I learnt a lot and really enjoyed myself. ”

Your programme can be full of activities and projects that get you buzzing and, along the way, you'll pick up experiences, skills and friends that will stay with you for the rest of your life.



Instrument lessons at Queen's Park High School are provided by Music for Life - a not-for-profit music education service working in partnership with 130 schools to teach around 4,500 pupils every week across Cheshire, Wirral and North Staffordshire. Music for Life can accommodate almost any child who books a course before the summer because it designs a new timetable from scratch every year. Additional places may become available during the year but they tend to be more limited. It is important to note that anyone wishing to try a course of lessons from September needs to book before the end of this term (certainly before August) to be sure of a place when school reopens. The cost of lessons can be spread over 12 months if required to help make things much more affordable, typically around £25 per month or less for most instruments for beginners (piano around £37 per month) and payment can be made by almost any debit, credit or pre-paid card.
