As a school we are currently reflecting upon the progress we have made against our three year school development plan which was put in place in 2015. Whilst we have much to celebrate in terms of our school improvement journey to date, we are equally ambitious for our future. Over the coming months we will be working with staff, students, governors and the Trust, to redefine our priorities, ensuring that we remain true to our vision. Our development plan for 2018-2021 will be in place by the end of June and I will share our key priorities with you before the end of the summer term.

## Trust Update

Planning permission for Christleton International Studio (CIS) has now been granted and we are currently preparing for the commencement of works which will be some time between the end of May and prior to our return in September. The main implication for our students during this time will be the relocation of our kitchen and dining arrangements to the East End Canteen area. A temporary kitchen will be installed and all food will be served from this locality. On completion of the build (around Christmas 2018), QPHS will have a new canteen and kitchen to return to which will be a significant improvement on our current facilities.

Work is also underway to replace our Food Technology classroom, which will now be located closer to the Technology area and will hopefully be up and running after the Easter break.

I hope you enjoy this latest edition of our school newsletter, a snapshot of our school life. I would like to wish you all a lovely Easter break and for all those who are off to Los Angeles with the PPA Faculty - have a fantastic time and look after yourselves!

Congratulations to Year 9 student Rory Jones who was selected to represent the North West region at the National Big Bang Young Scientists and Engineers finals at the NEC in Birmingham during British Science week.

Rory was announced as one of the winners of the regional heats at The Big Bang Fair North West with his project *'Chemical Rockets'*.

As part of the project, Rory created a series of rockets powered by chemical reactions. He has since showcased and demonstrated his rockets launching to visitors during the school's Open Evening in September and has been hard at work developing the project further ready for the national finals.





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# 'ALL VOICES' CONCERT

## Uniting children through the power of song

Over 140 children from primary schools across Chester and the QPHS Year 7 choir were in fine singing voice on Thursday 8th March and dazzled the audience as they took to the stage to perform in the 'All Voices' concert hosted by QPHS.

The showcase was held in the main hall and featured songs from around the world, eagerly performed by children in Years 2 - 5 from Belgrave, Chester Blue Coat, Dodleston C of E, Eccleston C of E, Hoole C of E, Overleigh St. Mary's and The Arches Community Primary Schools and supported by the QPHS Year 7 choir.

Since September each of the schools have been working with Miss Stanners, Teacher of Music at Queen's Park High School, whose aim was to unite children through the power of song and give them the opportunity to perform in front of a live audience in a professional setting.

“ A project on this scale was always something I had aspired to do from when I first began teaching. I've always recognised how important it is to instil a love of music from the earliest possible age in order for that to continue into later life. In a day and age when we seem to read more and more about the loss of music in schools, I wanted to be proactive in encouraging the growth of music in schools instead. # ENABLING ENTERPRISE

## The Lend-A-Hand Challenge

QPHS are now in their second year working with Enabling Enterprise. Enabling Enterprise are funded by Bank of America Merrill Lynch (BAML) and work in partnership with schools and businesses to support students to build enterprise skills and aspirations. In February, 23 Year 7 students visited BoAML to take part in the Lend-A-Hand challenge.

The session was all about problem-solving and staying positive as the students learnt about personal finance. They took part in a range of fun, fast paced activities to build their understanding of the necessity of budgeting. Through working in a team and being creative the students had to make important budgeting choices and ultimately take on the role of Financial Advisors.

All students were lucky enough to have a tour around BAML, even into high security areas, where they were able to see the complexities of a fast moving international financial house and the incredible use of technology. Students had close interaction with the employees of the business and were encouraged to ask questions and give opinions on a variety of subjects including educational requirements, expected salaries and working conditions. By listening and understanding to the advice the employees gave them the students felt confident to stand up and present their financial advice and learning from the day in front of their peers.

## Operation Moonbase

On Tuesday 23rd January QPHS hosted a challenge day led by Enabling Enterprise.

The event brought together Year 4 children from some of our local primary schools which included Lache Primary, Chester Blue Coat Primary and Belgrave Primary School. Throughout the course of the day QPHS Year 7 ambassadors that had been building their skills back at school were deployed as skills mentors to help the Year 4 children.

The challenge for the day was ‘Operation Moonbase’ and whilst in mixed groups, the children used their ‘working in a team’ skills to establish a new society on a distant moon called Utopia.

A series of tasks required teams to use their enterprise skills, particularly practising their problem solving using imagination and listening carefully.

Teams needed to select a crew to support them on their mission, then design a new species of animal to benefit society before finally creating a model of their own dream city.

The day culminated in a series of persuasive pitches at the Intergalactic Trade Fair which gave each team the opportunity to show off their fantastic ideas. Well done to all the Year 4 children.

Back in November 2017 during The Chester Literature Festival, Storyhouse commissioned poet Hollie McNish to transform their building into a poetry book. To coincide with Wayword, the Children's Literature Festival during February half-term the theatre wanted to hand over the building to children.


We were very excited to find out that Queen's Park High was one of the lucky schools chosen to be involved.

The aim of the workshop was for visiting and award winning poet, Sara Hirsch to help students create poems based on identity, libraries, history and stories. These poems would then be printed in their own handwriting and displayed on the walls around the Storyhouse building.

Sara is a London grown poet and spoken word educator. She is a former UK Slam Champion, third ranked in the World Slam Championships 2014, winner of the European Poetry Slam in Madrid 2016 and a 2017 BBC Slam Finalist. Sara has performed at Glastonbury, is a TEDx speaker, has featured on the BBC and has toured extensively both in the UK & Internationally.

The Year 7 students successfully completed two poems: one that is now displayed outside the baby changing room at Storyhouse and one that is featured in the teenage fiction section of the library.

# POETRY LIVE

## Manchester Opera House

During March, students in Years 10 and 11 had the opportunity to travel to Poetry Live at the Manchester Opera House. This event has been taking place annually for 20 years and gives students the opportunity to hear poets, whom they are studying for their GCSE English Literature exam, read their poems and discuss the genesis for their works. This time students heard from Poet Laureate Carol Ann Duffy, the inimitable John Agard, and the most brilliant advocate of the northern voice, Simon Armitage. Equally, there was a session with Tony Childs - formally Chief Examiner for GCSE English Literature - who gave students some pertinent advice on how to approach the trickiest aspect of the exam paper: the unseen poem!

There was much to be enjoyed and lots to be learned, both of which students will carry with them into the final weeks of preparation for their exams.





# SCHOOL OF ROCK HIT PRODUCTION

## Students 'Stick it to the Man'



Perhaps one of the most ambitious school productions the school has ever attempted was staged in February.

School of Rock is, on paper, a relatively straight forward show to put on. However, this year there was a real focus on the 'extras' that made the entire process itself just as important as the final product.

With support from peripatetic teachers and regular lunch time rehearsals, members of the cast became highly competent on their instruments - some of whom had never even played their instrument before the start of rehearsals in October!



The show itself was an absolute triumph in terms of the quality of the performances - both musically and dramatically - that were produced. With a relatively young cast it was incredible to see just how much talent we have here at Queen's Park High and what was even more amazing was the level of dedication and commitment shown by every member of the cast, crew and band.

Throughout the process we were visited by members of the West End School of Rock cast with Joel Montague (Mr Spencer/Dewey) leading a two hour workshop for our students back in November. This was greatly received and served to inspire all of our cast members to make the show their own.

The show itself was a resounding success performing to over 400 Year 5 children and staff from our feeder primary schools as well as over 700 members of the public over four evening shows.

Reviews and feedback from the show have all been extremely positive and we are very confident that the impact this show will have had on all involved will be both positive and profound. It was a fantastic celebration of QPHS talent and a shining example of what teamwork can achieve!


# CODING CLUB

Controlling robots with scripts

For Curriculum Enrichment this term; some of our Year 7 students have been given the opportunity to explore different programming languages including Python and JavaScript. Students have spent time coding their own video games through the BBC Micro:bit and getting to grips with scripts allowing them to control a robotic vehicle around the classroom.

Whilst coding, we are recording the WPM (words per minute) of students to see if coding can increase their speed and accuracy. With this data we plan on coding an interactive graph to show each student's progress. In our most recent lesson, we've tested out a few Python hacks for Minecraft running on a Raspberry PI 3. Jantsandorj Charnock has even used his musical knowledge to produce sounds and tunes from coding!

The Coding Club runs for Year 7 every Tuesday after school and is designed around a set number of tasks and hosted via our Moodle VLE. This enables them to access the course from home and continue learning about Computer Science in their own time.

Meet our Computer Science Leaders



The debate of the day was, 'This House believes that, given the right situation, even murder could be justified!'


